GOAL in a nutshell

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KA3 Policy Experimentations: 'Reducing the number of low skilled adults'

From 01/02/2015 to31/01/2018 (3 years)

8 countries involved and 16 partner organisations



Project's objectives

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Identifying critical success factors to develop educational guidance services for low educated adults

Developing a structural basis to upscale models for educational guidance in partner countries and beyond.



5 intervention levels

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- 1. Developing networks and partnerships at local, regional and national level
- 2. Developing/optimizing instruments for guidance of low educated adults
- 3. To identify specific competences of counselors to guide low educated adults
- 4. Outreach strategies: finding and testing ways to reach specific target groups
- **5.** Developing and testing qualitative guidance services



Evaluation methods

Process evaluation

- Institute of Education, Londen (NRDC) and local evaluators
- Developed a method for complex and multilateral initiatives in different context (12 sites, different target sub-groups)
- Limitations in experimental and quasiexperimental methods
 Theory of Change-model



Focus on local and regional networks

Why local networks?

- Adult Education provision is very broad (formal and nonformal education, private sector & in-company trainings, socio-cultural sector, ...
- Adult Guidance is linked to different domains: career guidance, lifelong guidance, educational guidance, social guidance,...
- Wide range of stakeholders supporting target groups: migration and integration sector, education sector, employment sector, social wellfare sector,...
- Responsibilities at different policy levels: from national to communal.
- Local networks and local collaboration initiatives feeding Flemish policy development (evidence-based)





De Stap (the step): A case study in Flanders



GOAL in Flanders

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- Testing and evaluating an educational guidance service for low educated adults
- 2 partners with existing service: de Stap and de Leerwinkel
- 2 initiatives with strong involvement of local authorities (the Province of West-Flanders and the City of Ghent): to identify the role of local governments and local stakeholders in the development of guidance services.



de Stap: educational advice center Ghent

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- Independent information service point for adult education (East-Flanders) (2003- ...)
- Guidance Service low educated young adults towards an educational degree (the City of Ghent) (2012- ...)
- Back office / Support for professionals (2003- ...)



Information service point adult education



A job seeker is referred to the Stap by VDAB (employment agency) for **re-orientation to re**education in order to find a job

To increase or optimize participation in adult education

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Guidance Service for low educated young adults

Word Wijs! Get smart!

- 2015-2017: Part of experimentation GOAL
- Unqualified young people 18-25 years old
- Learning pathway to certification/diploma secondary education
- Extensive Information session
- Counseling program
- Depending on individual needs
- Tailor-made
- Follow up

- Information Service/Educational guidance
- Not bound to educational networks
- Beyond different educational levels
- Expertise on the complete educational provision
- Expertise on unqualified school leaving

- Broad learning network: education, labour market, social welfare in Ghent, East-Flanders

- fragmented provision in adult education makes it difficult to find suitable courses for (low educated) adults: importance of educational guidance
- Institutionalised guidance services are mostly focusing on career guidance and/or employment opportunities: lack of educational focus and qualifications
